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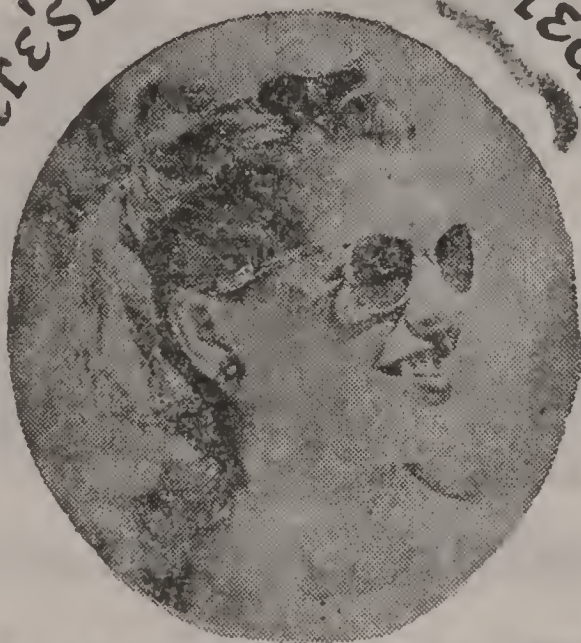

HISTORY OF BANGALORE

After a weary journey from Bombay in the west, Madras in the East and Guntakal in the North the travellers find a welcome change in climate and scenery on alighting at Bangalore.

Bangalore is the administrative capital of Mysore state. In the scheme of reorganization of the States in India which is on the anvil, Mysore or as some would call it "GREATER MYSORE" will be one of the major states with an area of 72,730 sq. miles and a population of 20 million. It will include the whole of the present Mysore, Coorg, North and South Kanara districts, Raichur, Gulbarga and Bidar districts of Hyderabad, Belgaum, Dharwar district and part of Bijapur district of Bombay state.

Mysore state has a long and glorious history. Under a succession of wise rulers and able administrators it took the lead in the establishment of Hydro-electric works and industrial undertakings and came to be known as the "MODEL STATE". Since the attainment of independence in 1947, Bangalore has grown by leaps and bounds. It is the biggest city in this region.





FORT, BANGALORE

This loveliest city had its origin in 13th century through a strange adventure of a king, Veera Ballala, who while on a hunting expedition lost his track and was separated from his retinue. On reaching this locality at nightfall he saw a dim light in a mud hut. The old woman in the hut could offer the wandering prince and his horse a small quantity of boiled beans "Beng-a-lu."

This memorable incident was commemorated and "Bengalu-ooru" is now known as Bangalore.

Leaving aside legend the modern history of Bangalore may be said to commence from A. D. 1537 when a famous local chieftain, Kempe Gowda, built a mud fort here, and fixed the boundaries of its future expansion in four directions by putting up watch-towers at the four cardinal points.

The mud fort whose remnants are still there was rebuilt in stone by Hyder Ali and greatly improved by his son Tippu Sultan who also built his palace nearby. David Baird of the English Army was captured and detained here. The fort was however taken over by Lord Cornwallis in the year 1791.

CLIMATE

Situated at an altitude of 3,000 ft. above sea level with a moderate annual rainfall of 35-40" and protected by the eastern and western ghats from the furies of wild monsoon gales and wind storms, Bangalore enjoys salubrious climate and equable temperature throughout the year. Until a couple of decades ago it was popularly known as the 'pensioners' Paradise.

PEOPLE AND LANGUAGE

The rapidly growing city-40-sq. miles-has a population of a million of all communities in India. The cosmopolitan touch is evident in the different modes of dresses, customs and the languages spoken. Although Kannada is the official language, Tamil, Telugu, Marathi, Malayalam, Konkani, Hindi, Urdu & English are understood by a large number. 53% of the population is literate.

COMMUNICATIONS

Bangalore has easy access to all the important places in South India by rail, road and air. It is the terminus for the broad gauge from Madras (sea port). It is connected with Arsikere, Davangere, Hubli, Poona on the west, Hindupur, Guntakal and Bombay (a sea port) via north and Mysore on the south by train. At the two railway stations, Cantonment and City, auto-rikshaws, taxies horse-drawn carts known as Jutkas and the B. T. C's buses are available at scheduled rates fixed by the corporation. (list is given separately). Near the Cantonment station the western type hotels are situated while Indian type hotels are found nearer to the city Railway station.

AIRWAYS

Daily services are available to and from Madras, Trivandrum Cochin, Coimbatore, Vishakapatnam, Bhubaneswar, Calcutta, Bombay, Poona, Delhi and Hyderabad. Air Bookings can be made at the Air India Offices at Mahatma Gandhi Road, Bangalore-1 and M/s. Ram Mohan & Co. Ltd, in Kempegowda Road, Bangalore-2.

BUSES

Within the state, the Mysore Government Road Transport Department have an efficient well-knit bus services to all the important centres at fairly regular intervals. In addition there are quite a number of private buses available on hire. The important bus terminus in the city is Kalasipalyam near the city market from where reservations can be made in advance.

For those who want to despatch their goods expeditiously there are a number of lorry services to all destinations in south India.

INTERNAL TRANSPORT

The Bangalore Transport Company has the monopoly control for running the internal bus services which will shortly be taken over by the Government. There are 3 important terminus from where the connections are available :—(1) City Market, (2) Majestic circle and (3) Black pally.

Apart from these, auto-rikshaws, taxies, Jutkas and victorias are available at reasonable rates. Cycles are the common mode of conveyance for the local population.

N.B. :—An appendix at the end of the book gives Railway, Air & Bus timings and routes.

Bangalore has its own marked personality. It is outstanding in many respects when compared to other big cities in India. For one thing the towering scrapers are conspicuous by their absence. Its large parks and gardens in the heart of the city itself, its broad clean roads with shady boulevards, circles and fountains, its beautiful buildings—both old and new—its numerous hotels catering to all tastes and purses, its cozy bungalows, its great many industries and yet the calm, serene and leisurely atmosphere, it is these things that make a traveller postpone his departure and then depart reluctantly.

EDUCATION

Bangalore has some of the outstanding educational institutions in South India providing technical and Occupational courses.

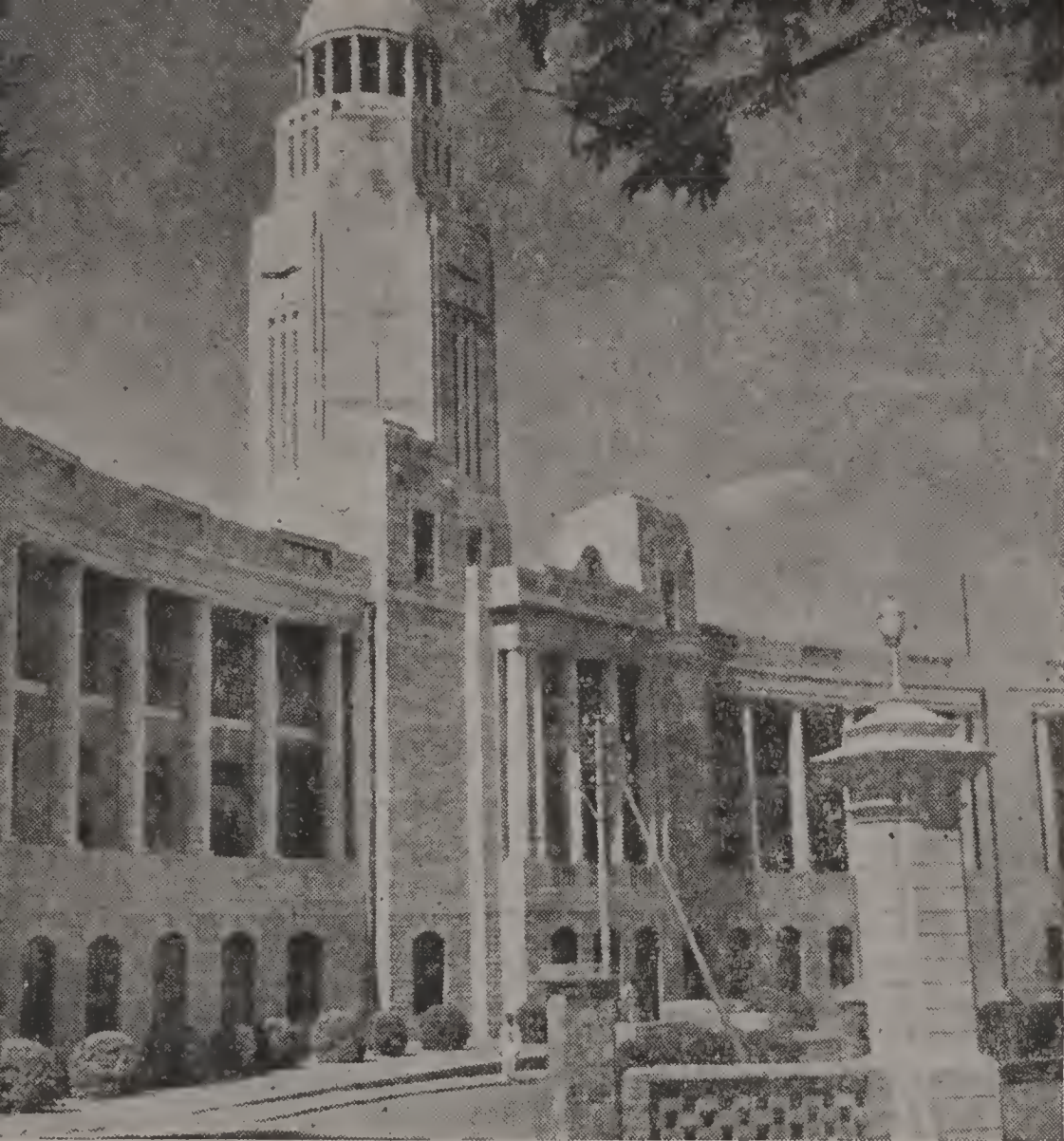
The Indian Institute of Science is a pioneer research centre in India for advanced studies.

Founded in 1911 by that great philanthropist J. N. Tata, with the active sympathy and support of both the State and the Central Governments, the Institute started with the Departments of General and applied chemistry and Electrical Technology. Today the Institute offers facilities for scholars all over India in Biochemistry, Metallurgy, Internal Combustion Engineering, Communication — Engineering, Pharmacology. A department of power engineering with a high Voltage Research Laboratory was recently established with the generous grant of the Government of India.

The Institute's contribution in the advancement of higher education cannot be underestimated. Situated in a quiet spot at the end of Malleswaram, in the midst of vast grounds, it is ideal for conducting research.

RAMAN INSTITUTE

The new building east of Tata Institute is the world famous Raman's Institute. Mainly devoted to studies relating to Physics, the Institute possesses astonishing collections of stones, sapphires and diamonds. Interviews are strictly limited and visitors are advised to take previous permission.

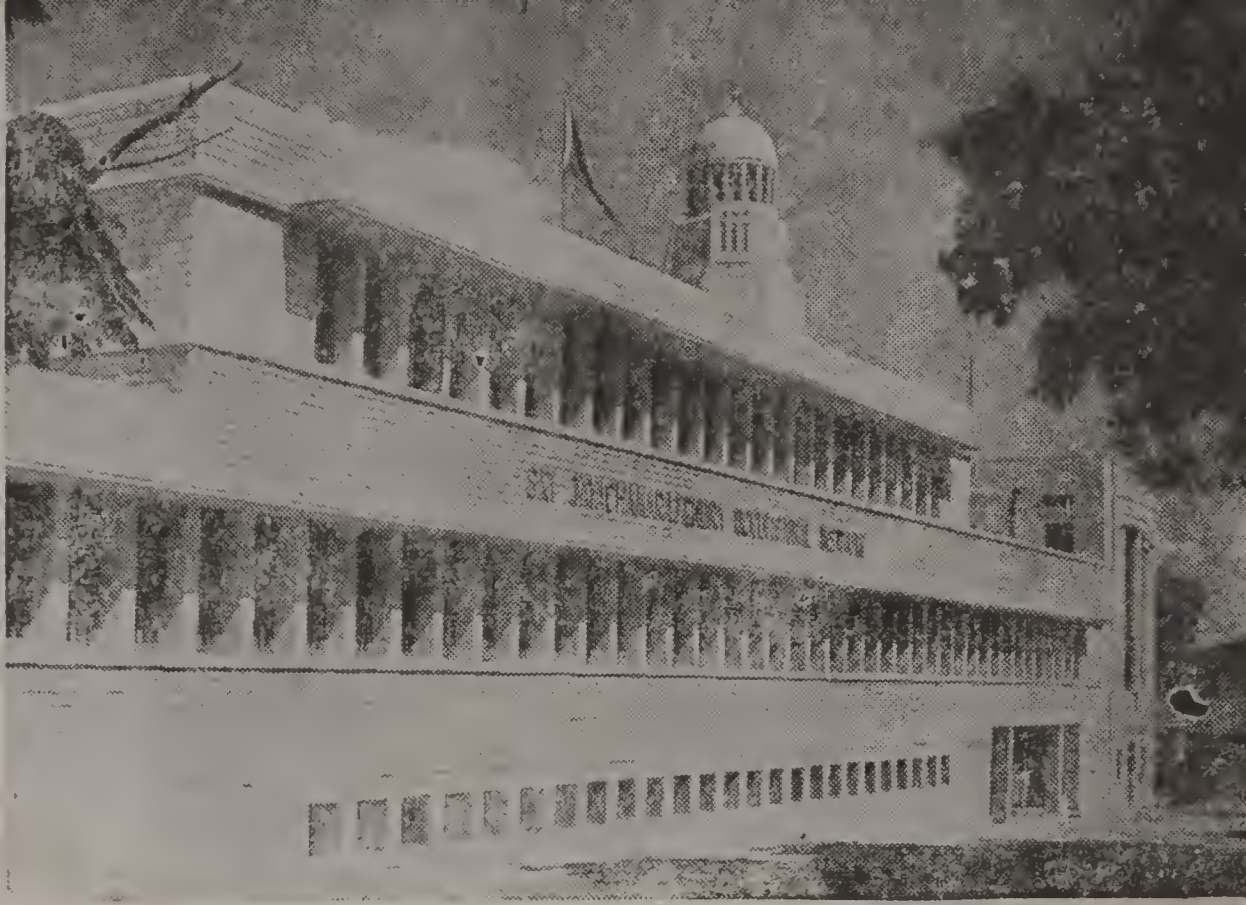
COLLEGES

Although the University of Mysore has its H. Q. in Mysore, the Central College and most of the colleges are located in Bangalore, where a number of outstanding statesmen and scientists studied. In the heart of the city is the Central College, the Intermediate college, the Government Engineering College, the Commerce College, the Maharani's College for women, situated between Kempegowda Road, and Sri Jayachamarajendra Occupational Institute.

Besides these there are 5 other private colleges and a medical college.

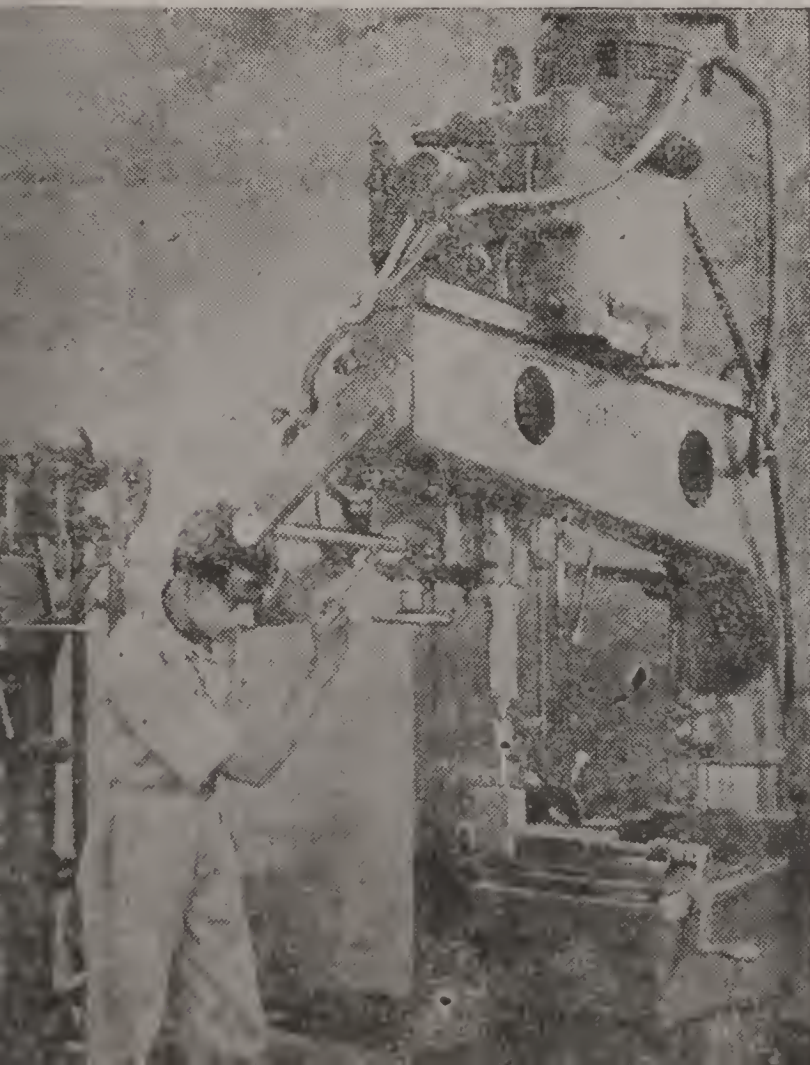
Education up to metriculation is taught in Kannada while college education is taught in both the languages.

The Krishnarajendra Technological Institute offers diploma courses in a number of Technological subjects and degree in Textile Engineering.



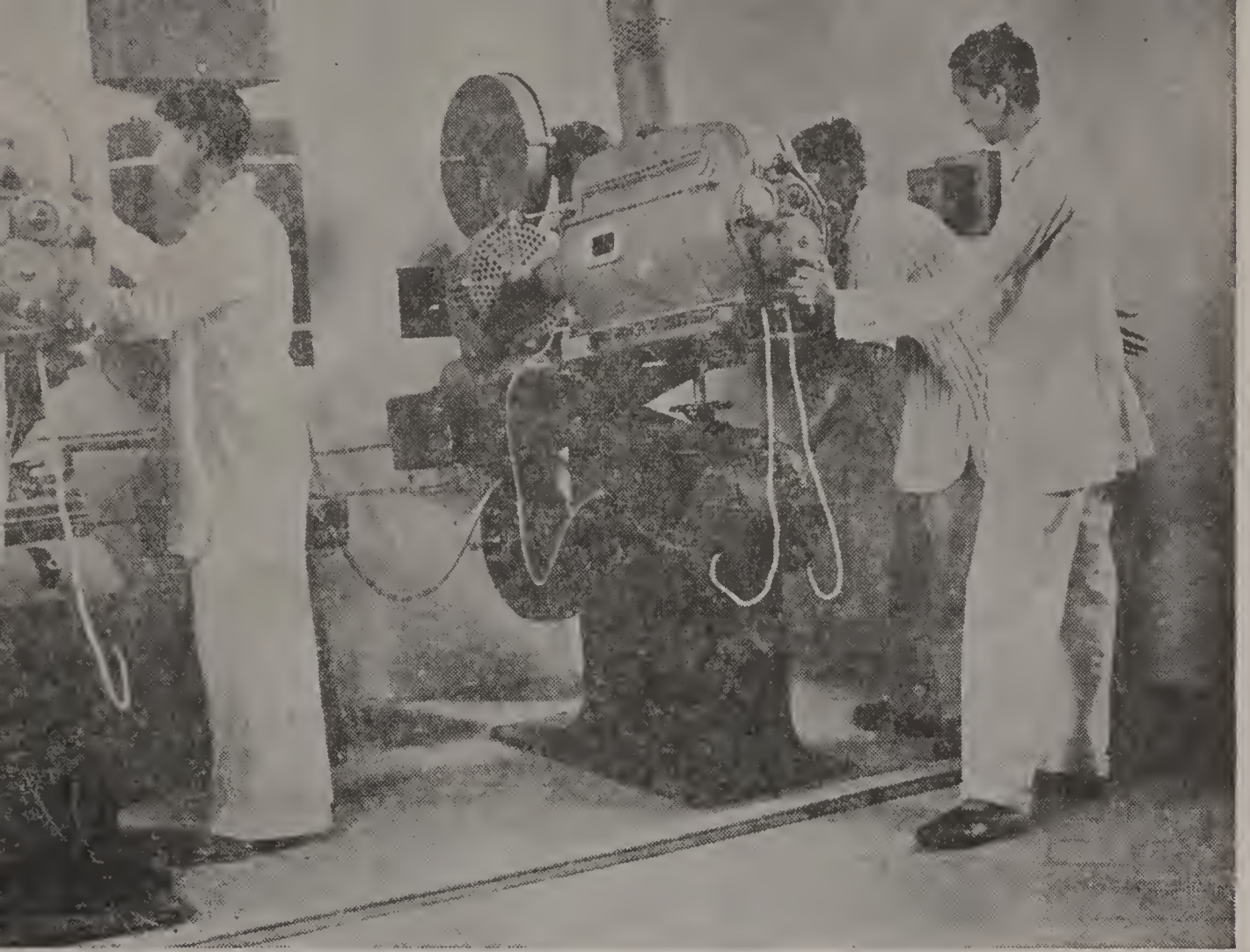
SRI JAYACHAMARAJENDRA OCCUPATIONAL INSTITUTE

Sri Jayachamarajendra Occupational Institute is the only one of its kind in India. Started on the initiative of Dr. M. Visweswaraya the Institute offers general courses in Mechanical and Civil Engineering. The special, courses are in Machinist, Welding and Sheet metal, Instrument Mechanics, Boilers Engines.

Radio Engineering, Cinematography, Sound recordings Mining, Cerammics, and Printing Technology. The certificate courses consist of Radio Mechanics, Electric Wire men, Cinema Operators, Automobile Drivers, Mechanics and even Tailoring occupations.

The Institute attracts students from regions like Pepsu, Assam, Kashmir, C. P. Andhra, West Bengal in addition to all the border states.

In addition to the above, big factories like Hindustan Air Craft, Indian Telephone Industries, Hindustan Machine Tools, and Bharat Electronics train in their factories to be absorbed later.

The Sanskrit College in Chamarajpet teaches Vedas and Sutras and is an authority on this ancient Literature.

Corresponding to the numerous varied educational Institutions are hostels—Government and Private—providing modern amenities at minimum cost.

LIBRARIES AND READING ROOMS

Being an educational centre Bangalore has ample library and reading room facilities. Every suburb has at least one free reading room while general and technical books can be had from the public libraries.

The most important Public Library is housed in Seshadri Memorial Hall in Cubbon Park. It is one of the finest libraries in the South with reference books

on all branches of knowledge. It is open from 11-00 a.m. to 7 p.m. Reference books are permitted to be taken home.

The United States Information Service Library is located opposite the Corporation Offices and is open from 9-00 a.m. to 6-00 p.m. on week days.

PARKS AND GARDENS

If the climate of Bangalore is exhilarating its gardens are superb. Known as the garden city of India, Bangalore abounds in horticultural splendours. The traveller comes across what look like green carpets with a variety of flowers in every suburb. A greater variety of vegetables, flowers and fruits is not raised anywhere else in India. Apples, Figs, Mangoes, Grapes, and English and continental vegetables are grown and exported.

Perhaps the loveliest spot in the city is Lal-bagh, a vast pleasure garden founded during the time of Hyder Ali and developed by his son Tippu.

The Band Stand

The well turfed park is visited by thousands of citizens every evening. On Sundays the electrically lit automatic fountain draws huge crowds after sunset. Nearby is the band stand in which the Orchestra plays every Sunday evening. In the heart of the park is a restaurant serving coffee and South Indian dishes.

The Century club is also situated in the park. It provides facilities for Golf, Billiards, Tennis and also arranges for lunches, tea and dinners.

At the eastern end of the park are museum, Victory hall, and the Statues of Queen Victoria and King Edward VII facing the Mahatma Gandhi Road, the main commercial centre of the civil station.

The General Post Office, the Tele-graph Office and the old Residency (now guest house) are situated in the park which has now been re-named the Sri Chamaraja Park.

The Olympic stadium is to the south of the park in the Sampangi Tank bed.

WATER SUPPLY

Water supply for the city is provided from two lakes both of which are incidentally week-end picnic resorts. The Hessara-ghatta lake which is only 15 miles to the north west of Bangalore supplies about 2.5 million gallons while Thippagondanahalli—now known as Chamaraja sagar—supplies 10.7 million gallons per day. The water is pumped to Reservoirs and jewel filters in the city. The supply is however inadequate to the growing population. The authorities are taking necessary steps to increase the capacity to 16 million gallons per day.

SPORTS

The spacious play grounds one comes across frequently are a tribute to the planners of the city. Like in all big cities, students and workers take to outdoor games. Bangalore has pride of place in hockey and football. The numerous clubs have their own tennis

grounds and provide opportunities for indoor games too. The golf links at the cubbon park has select membership

The University pavilion near the Central college and the Stadium in Sampangi Tank are centres of important sports events which attract big gatherings even from distant places.

The Schools and Colleges encourage indigenous games also. Physical development is an important aspect of education in the State.

CLUBS

The outstanding clubs in the city are the Century Club in Cubbon Park, the Bowring Institute in St. Marks Road, the City Institute in Basavangudi, the Malleswaram Club,

the Bangalore Club in Cantonment. All of them have fine tennis courts and facilities for indoor games. Admissions for casual membership are entertained.

THE RACE COURSE

Between the electric "A" station and the High grounds is situated the race course which is reputed to be one of the best in India. Races are held annually between June and September. Horses from Calcutta, Bombay, Madras and Hyderabad participate. The well-to-do people from these areas besides escaping the sweltering heat enjoy the thrilling sport in an ideal surroundings and pleasant weather.

BUILDINGS

The city has no claim for archaic splendours like Delhi or Humpi. Nevertheless there are many buildings worthy of visit.

TOWN HALL, BANGALORE

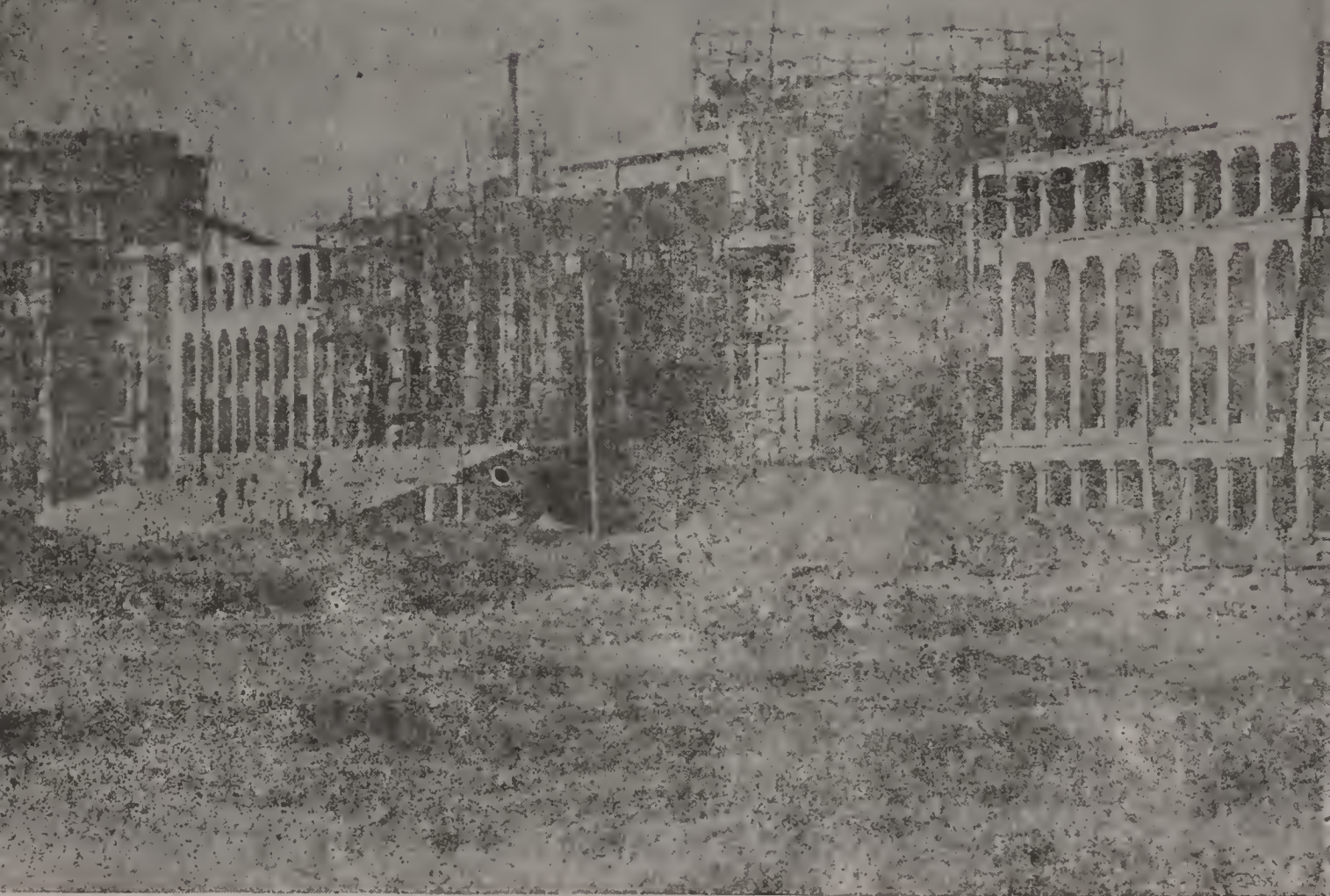
The Town hall, majestically facing the Silver Jubilee Park is an imposing building. In recent times many National and International Conferences were held here.

Now under construction and nearing completion is the Vidhana Soudha. Easily the biggest building in the South, it is built in Dravidian style. Opposite Vidhan^a Soudha is the old public offices a brick and mortar edifice in red in Ionic order. The central College with its gothic spires, the Technological Institute, the Victory Hall in the cubbon park are impressive in their own way.

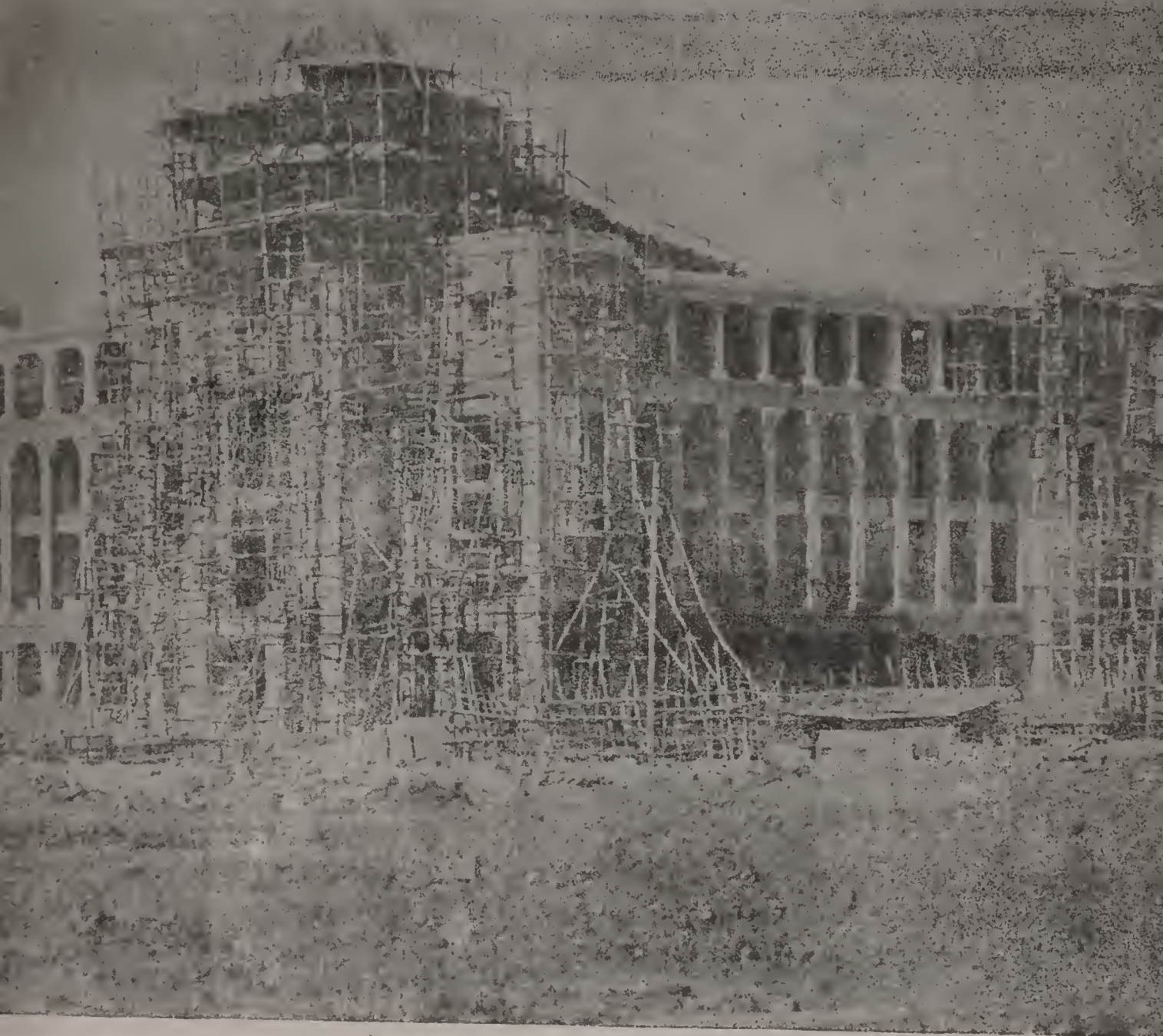




Planned to provide for all the Government Offices and also to provide better auditorium space for both the Houses of Legislature, the Vidhana Soudha is a magnificent structure in granite.

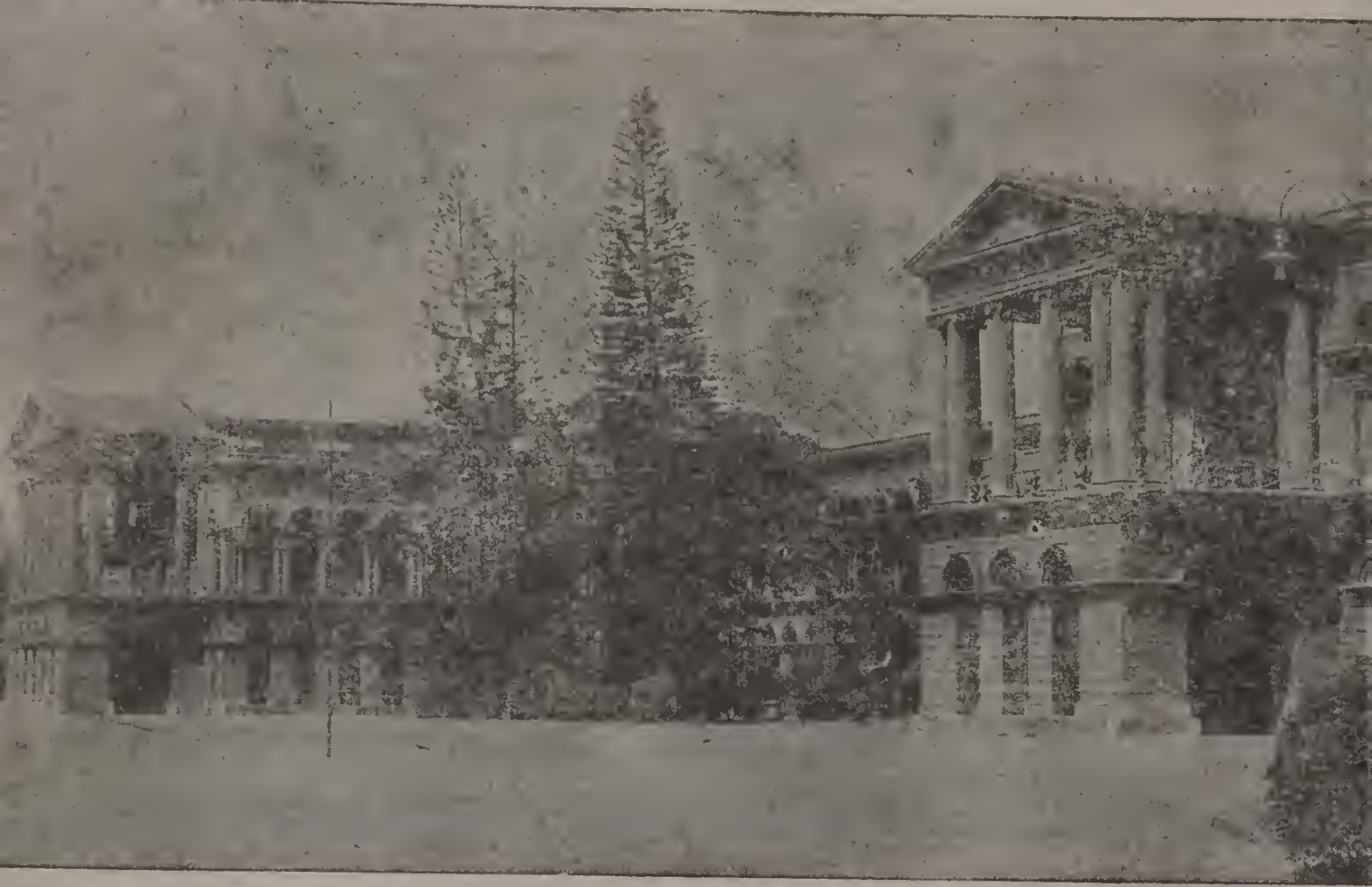
This imposing building is situated in the central locality between civil and city areas.

The building is rectangular in shape measuring 200 feet north to south and 350 feet east to west, with two open gardens each measuring 230 feet squares. It has a total plinth area and a total floor area of about 5,05,000 sq. feet.



It is the biggest building in South India. The central wing accommodates the Banquet Hall in the ground floor and the Legislative Assembly in the first and second floors. The top stories are served with 5 lifts something all too rare in Bangalore.

This is not all. It would appear that even greater attention is paid to Sculpture and Painting. Statues, Paintings, Murals, Tapestry, Wood work, will enhance the beauty and grandeur of the Dravidian style Building.

A visit to the Museum at the eastern end of the Cubbon Park will be an interesting experience. It has many old coins, varieties of stuffed birds and beasts, historical and archeological finds, and many curios.

The Fort opposite the market, the temples at Ulsoor and Visweswara-puram, the Gavigangadhareswara temple at Gavipuram are visited by devotees throughout the year.

GOVERNMENT OFFICES

With the inauguration of Greater Mysore Bangalore will be the capital of the biggest state in South India. Its importance therefore is greatly enhanced. High administrative offices of the state Government are located here.

The Offices of the ministers, the Secretariat, the High Court are housed in the old Secretariat building known as “Attara Katcherei” in Cubbon Park. The new public Offices, the Survey offices, are near the Krishnarajendra Technological Institute.

However it is proposed to shift all the Government departments to Vidhana Soudha when it is ready for occupation. The Central Government's Income Tax offices are located in United India Buildings while the A.I.R. offices are in Residency Road.

BANKS

All the leading banks in India have their Branches here. Most of the banks are situated either in Kempegowda or Narasimnaraja Road. A list of the institutions is appended at the end.

ELECTRICITY

Thanks to the natural waterfalls in Mysore state, electricity is abundant and also comparatively cheap in Bangalore. This explains the location of quite a few major industries in the city.

A great consumer of electricity the city gets its electric power from Sivasamudram power station which is about 73 miles, as well as from the Jog power station. Its giant industries like Hindustan Aircraft, the Hindustan Machine Tools, The Indian Telephone Industries, Bharat Electronics, Porcelain Factory, Textile mills and numerous small and big industries are

supplied from the Sivanahalli station in Rajaji Nagar. There are some 60,000 domestic lighting and 4,500 industrial installations.

FESTIVALS AND FAIRS

In addition to the usual festivities, Bangalore is noted for its KARAGA festival held every April on a full moon day. The temple dedicated to Dharmaraja of Mahabharatha fame is situated in Nagarthpet. In a mile long procession the chief Priest carries an earthen pot containing green grams unaided by hands and passes through all the important roads in the city in the moonlit night, piloted by a band of devotees armed with long drawn swords.

People from all parts of the State throng the city. Business is brisk, the bazaars and restaurants remaining open throughout the night.

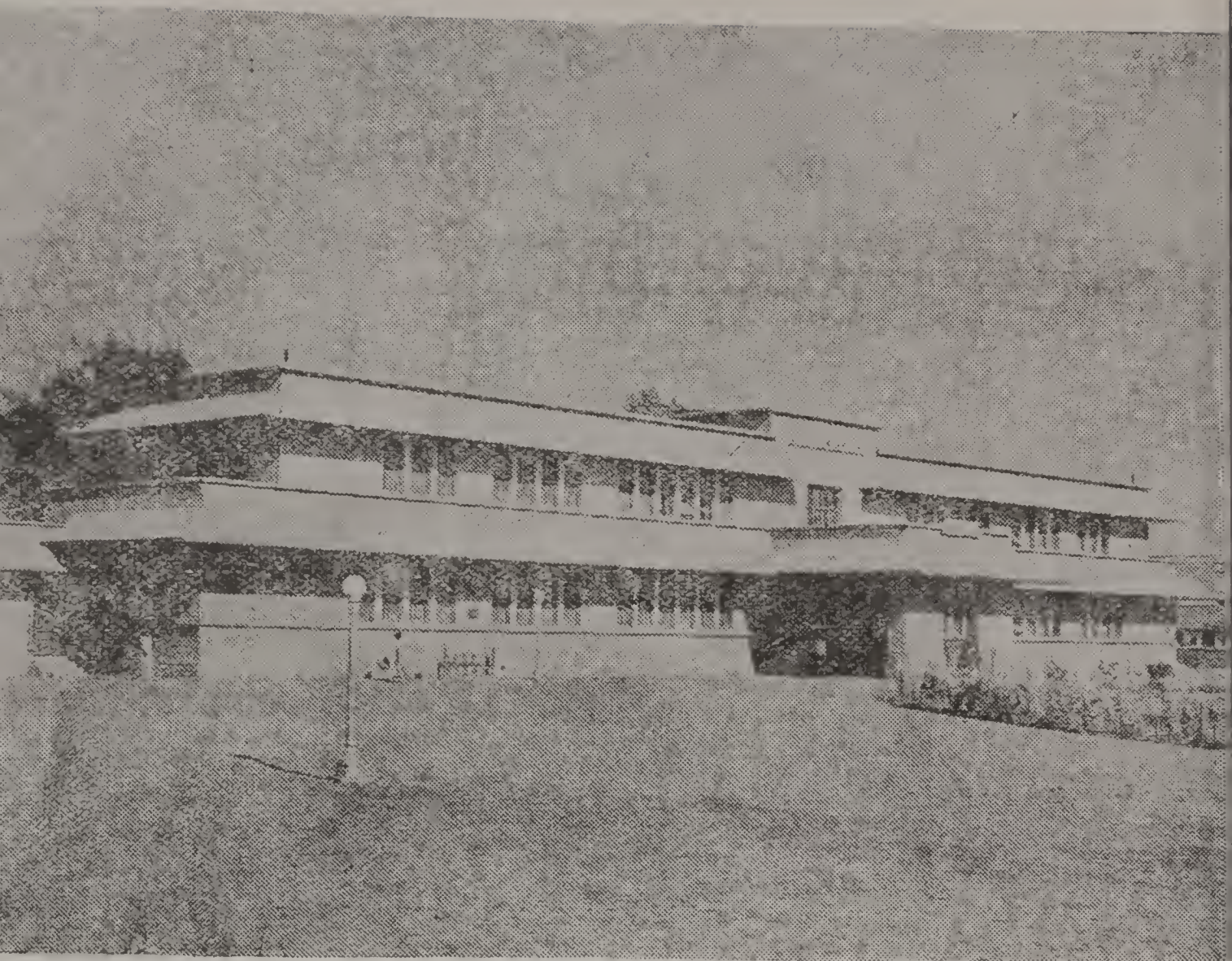

The hospitals here have vast open space, ample ventilation and a sense of roominess in addition to the mild soothing breeze.

The Victoria hospital opposite to city market is the biggest general hospital. The Vanivilas hospital beside the fort is exclusively meant for women and children. The Minto Ophthalmic hospital is located behind the Victoria hospital.

The Bowring Hospital in cantonment, the St. Martha Hospital in Kempegowda Road are two other notable institutions.

Besides, there is the Mental Hospital off wilson gardens.

HEALTH SERVICE

Coupled with free medical facilities, the Corporation and the state Government maintain an efficient health service. Any out-break of epidemic is properly checked. Indeed the cleanliness of the city has won

acclaim from many visiting dignitaries. Fortunately for the citizens the frequent visits of foreign statesmen for the several National and International conferences have helped the neatness and beautification of the city.

In addition to the above there are several paying guest houses run by westerners. And of course, that there is no prohibition in and around Bangalore, is a fact many a visitor seems to appreciate. Most of the western types of Hotels have bars attached to them and supply all varieties of drinks. There are also scattered over the city taverns, where beer and drinks are sold to cater to the needs of the locality where they are situated.

COFFEE HOUSES, RESTAURANTS

A special feature of Bangalore as with other South Indian cities and towns, is its Coffee houses or popular restaurants or hotels, where the ordinary beverages like coffee, tea, milk, etc., are supplied along with edible dishes like pancake, steamed cakes etc., some of which have won wide popularity like the IDLIES with SAMBAR which is a plate of steamed cakes with vegetable gravvy to taste; the RAVADOSA which is the ordinary pancake with spiced vegetable curry. Several sweet and sour dishes are available at these Indian

Coffee Houses where large business is carried on every day. For the lunch or late after-noon tiffin a visit to one or other of these Indian restaurants is an interesting experience.

SHOPPING CENTRES

The chief shopping centres in the city of Bangalore are Chickpet for cloth and garments; Dodpet for hardware and general goods, Balepet for stationery etc, Arcot Srinivasachar Street for Chemicals, drugs and patent medicines, and Sri Narasimharaja Road for machinery, automobiles, Cycles and Engineering. Old taragpet and Chamrajpet are centres for wholesale business in provisions, oil and oilseeds, cereals and flower. Fruits and vegetables are sold both in wholesale and in retail in the two main markets, the Krishnarajendra Market in the City area and in the Russel Market in the Cantonment area. In the line of clothing, Bangalore offers some of the most popular and fashionable silk fabrics and cotton textiles of Bangalore manufacture are well known throughout India and the East. Silverware and gold jewellery is claimed to be done with great skill and craftsmanship in Bangalore than anywhere else. For the setting of diamonds and other precious stones the place has a reputation.

The manufacture of Sandalsticks for purpose of religious worship is an important local industry in Bangalore and in the city of Mysore. Some of the better varieties of these Products are welcomed far outside the boundaries of our land in England, France and America. A visit to the Government Depot of Mysore Arts and Crafts on the Mahathma Gandhi Road gives a full view of all these and many other varieties of Mysore manufactures and craftsmanship to the visitor who can also make purchases of his requirement and carry them or direct the same to be sent to his home address in India or any foreign country.

In the Cantonment area chief shopping centres are located on the Commercial Street: Mahathma Gandhi Road, and Brigade Road.

TOURIST INFORMATION CENTRES

The government of India have opened an office at Mahathma Gandhi Road in the civil area to provide information to the tourists.

The Principal Information Officer, to the Government of Mysore has his office in the old Secretaria Buildings and he will assist the tourists with information.

Recently Messers Mysore Traveles (Private) Limited, Travel Agents have opened their office in Gandhinagar in the heart of Bangalore to provide guides to tourists, arrange transport, excursions, tours, and hotel accomodation and all other facilities required by the tourists.

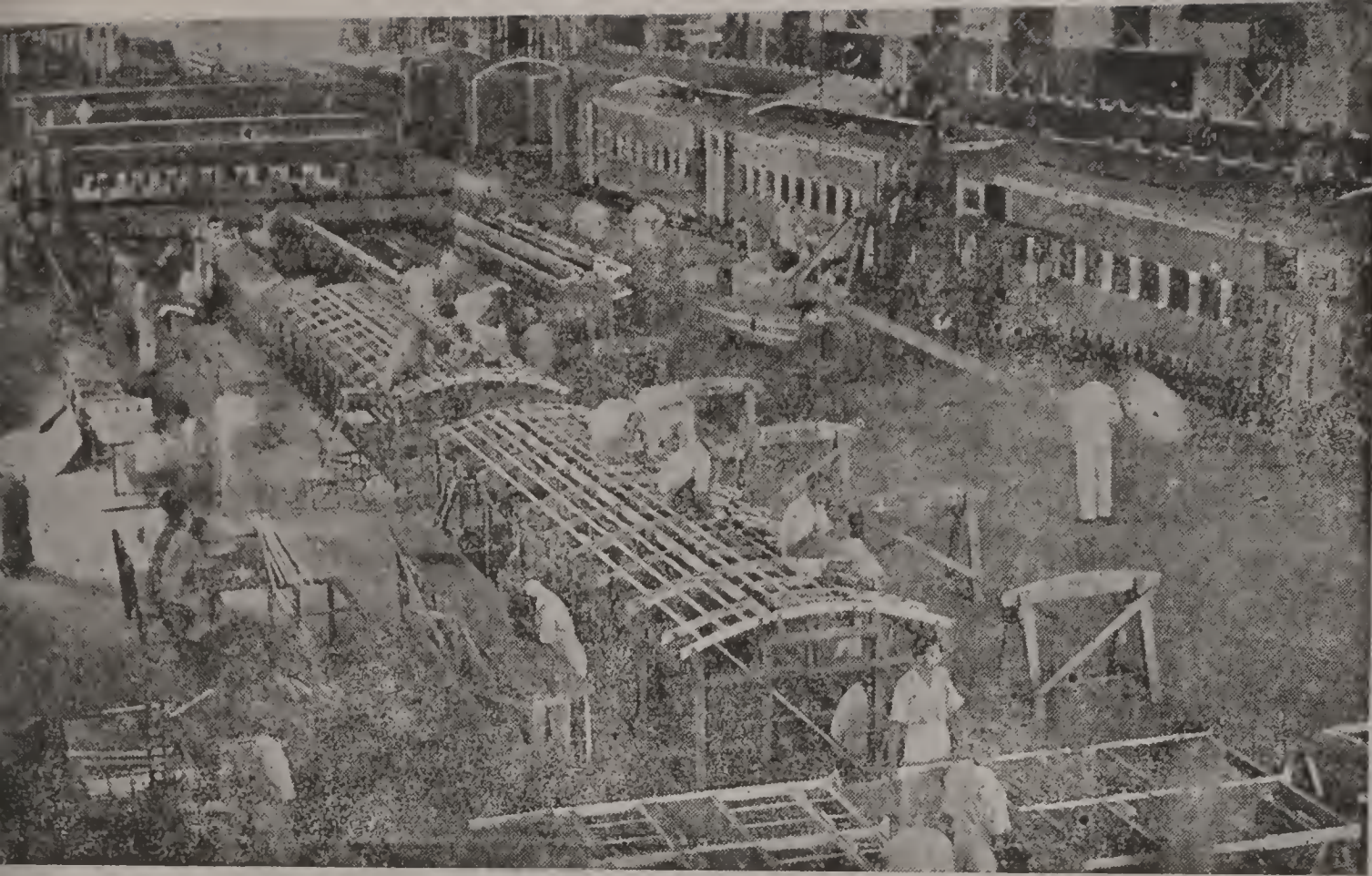

Besides this, the Factory is engaged in the construction of all-metal rail coaches and prefabricated bus kits.

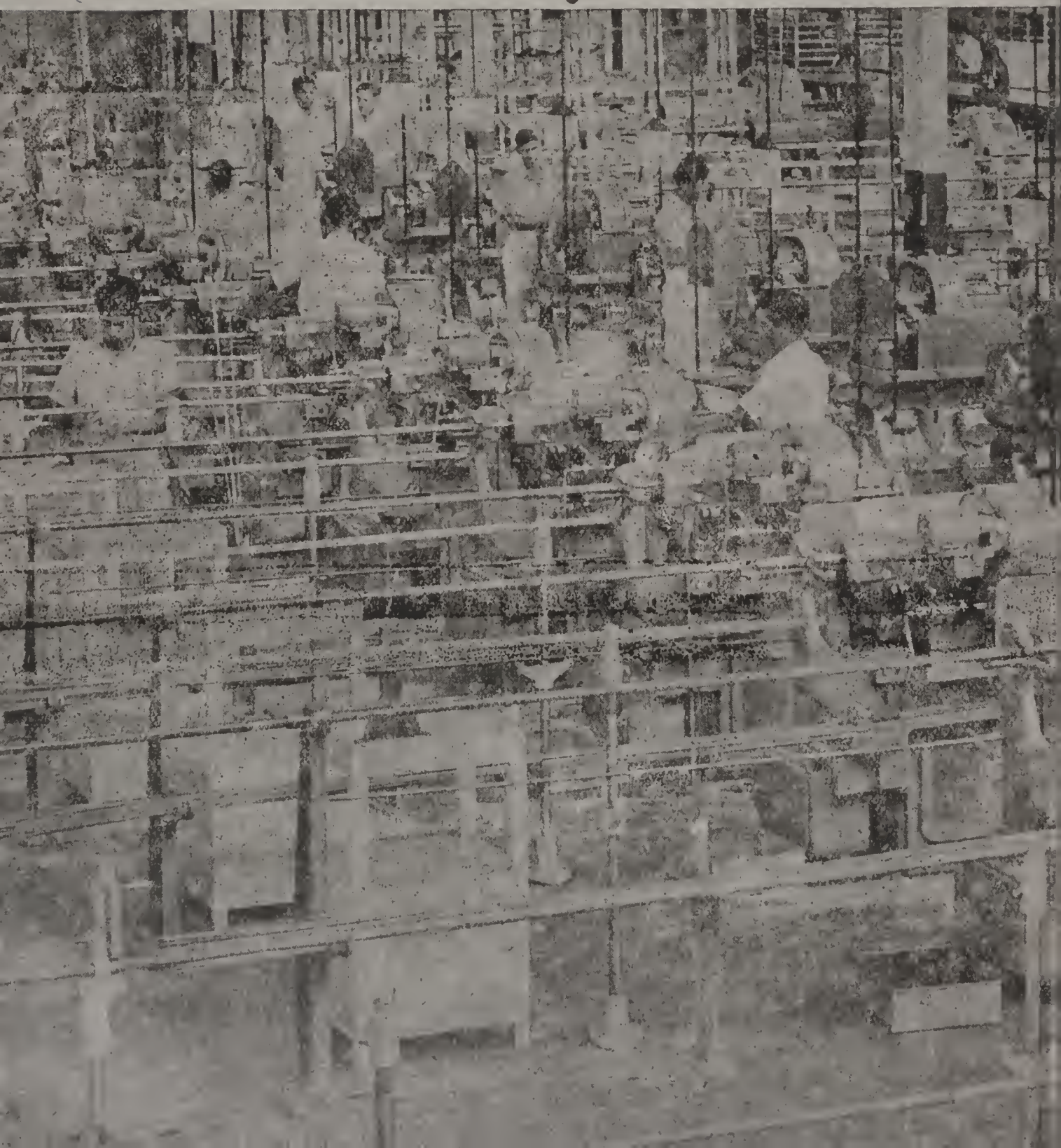

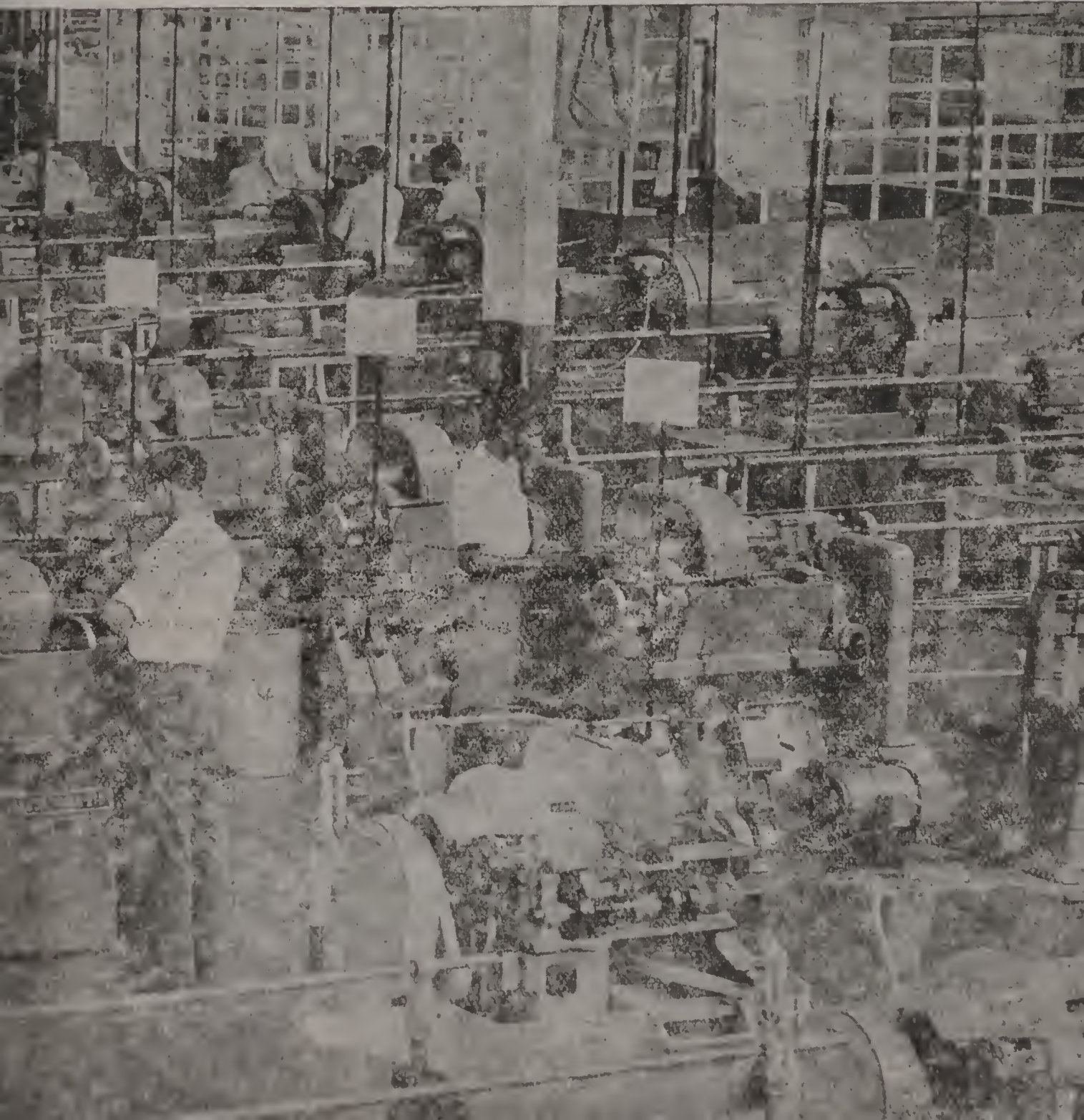

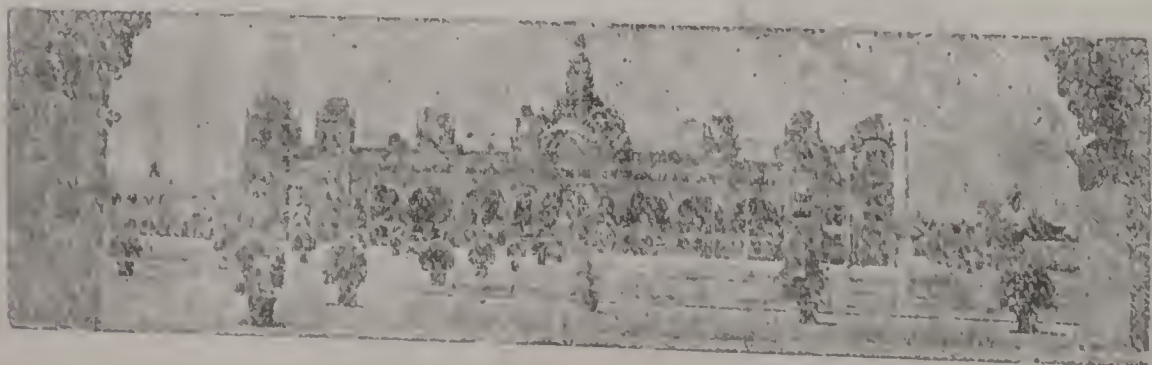

SIVAGANGA: A fine hill station of historic and religious interest, 38 miles from Bangalore.

CHAMARAJA SAGAR: By road it is 22 miles from Bangalore. It is a reservoir built across the Arkavathi river at Tippagondanahalli to store water for the supply of drinking water to Bangalore. It is an ideal resort for picnics. The Travellers' Bungalow has all the modern facilities.

NANDI HILL: Situated 38 miles north of Bangalore

at a height of 4850 feet above the sea, this hill is health resort, hollowed by the stay of Mahatma Gandhi. There are five well-furnished Bungalows with excellent catering arrangements. The lake in the hill is reputed to be the health giving nector. There is a well-maintained road to the top of the hill and a regular bus service in operation from Bangalore. The hill can also be reached by rail, the nearest point being a village, 'Nandi', three miles from the bottom of the hill on Bangalore—Chickballapur line.

DEVARAYANA DURGA: This is a hill 3,940 feet above the sea level situated 9 miles from Tumkur. The hill is rich in forest and noted for a historic temple at the top.

HESARAGATTA: Sixteen miles from Bangalore, there is a large lake supplying drinking water to a section of Bangalore. A poultry farm and a fruit research station are maintained here on up-to-date lines. The boat club and the beautiful T. B. provide ideal rest and vacation.

DEVANAHALLI: The birth place of Tippu Sultan, Devanahalli is 20 miles from Bangalore. Tippu had built a fortress here the ruins of which can still be seen.

WHITEFIELD: It is an Anglo-Indian settlement, 10 miles from Bangalore. It is also a tobacco-growing centre.

KOLAR: This district headquarters is rich in antiquities. Several ancient temples are here. The place is known for its woollen shawls known as "Kamblies".

KOLAR GOLD FIELDS: About 60 miles from Bangalore, by road or rail, they contain some of the deepest gold mines in the world.



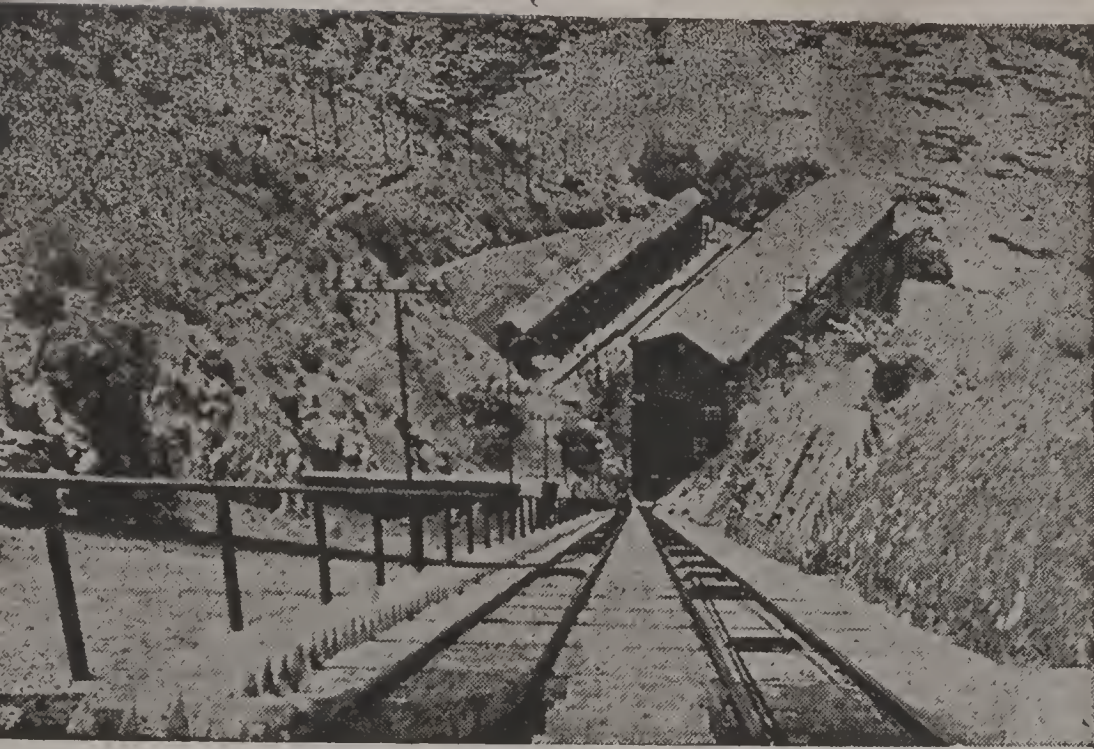

Bangalore and Mysore is expanding in the past 3 decades from a small town to a big city. In addition to Sugar, liquor is also manufactured here.

SHIMSHAPURA : Shimshapura is the hydro-electric station centre. Here the Shimsha river joins Cauvery. This is 24 miles from Maddur.

SIVASAMUDRAM : Situated about 27 miles from Maddur is this beautyspot. This is the spot of the first hydro-electric project in Mysore. Here both the branches of the Cauvery make a descent of about 200 feet in a succession of rapids and falls.

SRIRANGAPATNA : On the island of the Cauvery river is this historic town, 10 miles from Mysore. It was founded in 994 A. D. and was later the capital of Mysore during Hyder Ali and Tippu. The huge temple of Sri Ranganatha and the large mosque of Tippu Sultan with two tall minarets are points of interest. Outside the fort are Daria Daulat Bagh, a summer palace,

distance of 88 miles south-west of Bangalore, and in valley formed of two ridges this is renowned for its gardens and Palaces. It is also the capital of the state as the Rajpramukh resides here. The transformation of Mysore from a small town confined to the limits of the fort to the present handsome and growing city is something phenomenal. Mysore today is a city of magnificent and wide roads, imposing buildings and fairy parks. The city attracts huge crowds once in every year during Dasara, for both the Rajasabha and the exhibition. Places of interest are the Zoological Gardens, the Palace, the Chamarajendra Technical Institute, the Sandal oil Factory, Sri Krishnarajendra Mills, The Railway workshop, the Silk Factory, the Jagan Mohan Palace, Lalitha Mahal and the Government House. The Chamundi Hill lies two miles southeast of the fort,

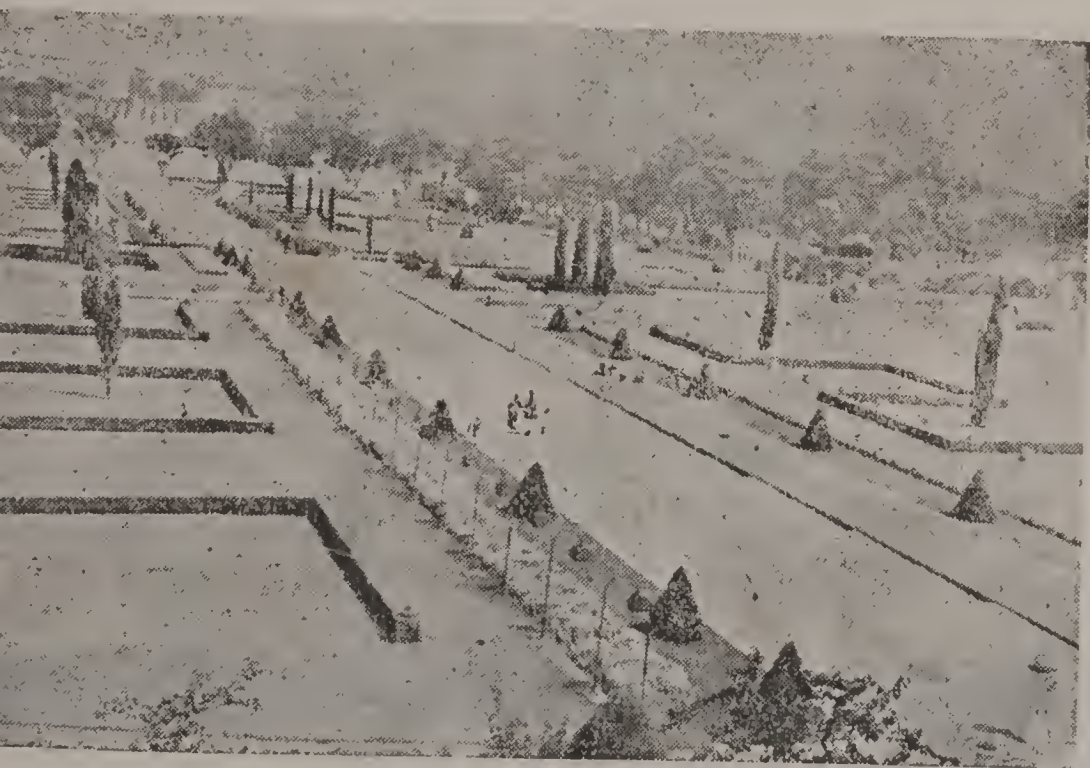

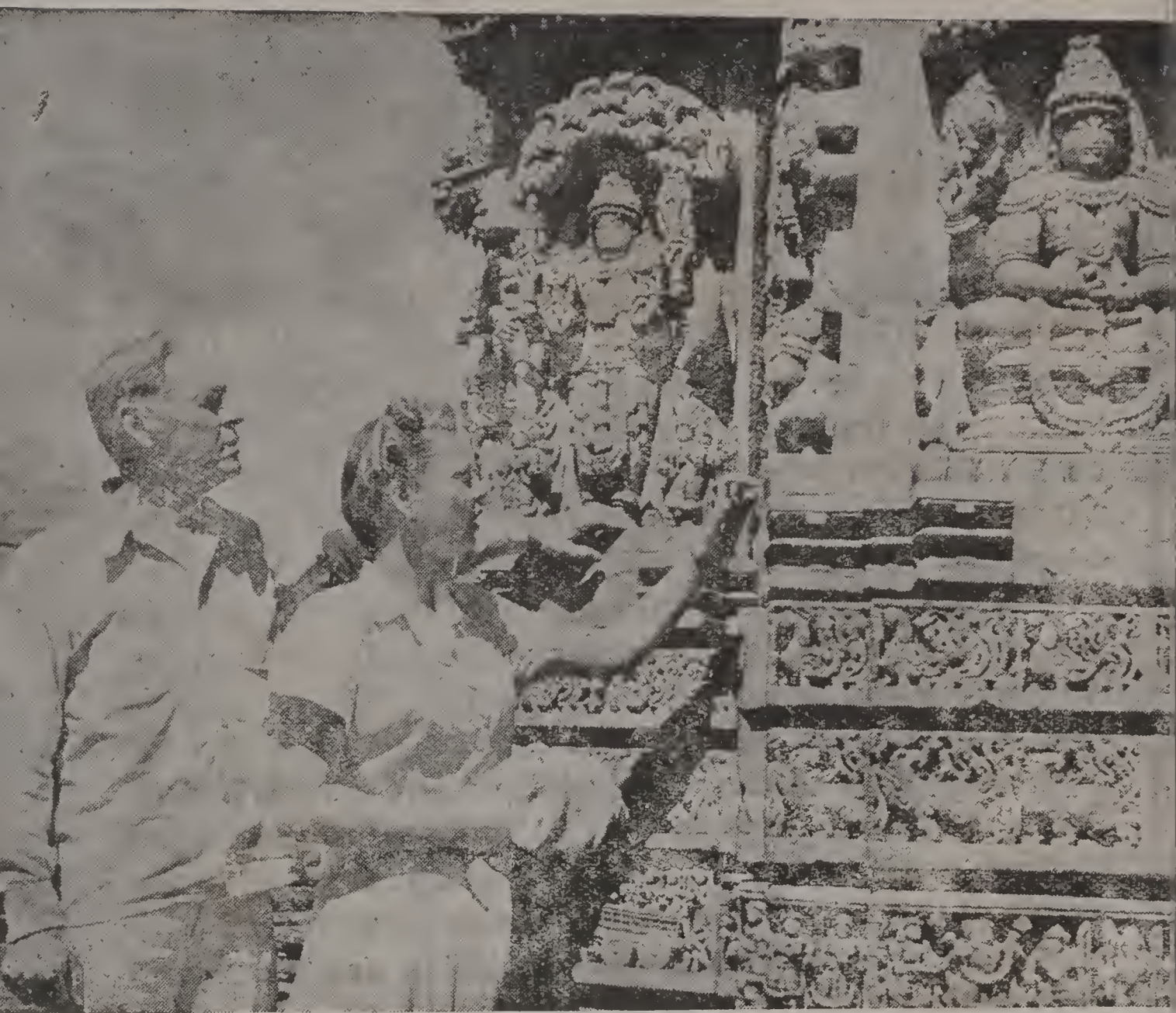
nuity has made the best illuminated terraced garden below the dam aptly called "Brindavan". It has become a theme for poets and artists for its natural setting and for the fine blending of the effects of light, colour and water in the creation of this fairyland. The gardens are illuminated on week-end days and on special occasions. The terrace gardens at Brindavan and the palatial hotel there are said to be amongst the world's beauty spots. The visitors are spellbound. Their spontaneous joy and happiness are inexplicable. The hotel itself is so situated that from there one can get a nice panoramic view of the gardens and the country side. There is a fine swimming pool constantly supplemented by fresh overflowing water. A fountain installed in the centre of the pool throws up columns of water as high as 140 feet. Boats and rowing facilities are also available here.

SRAVANABELAGOLA: The world famous "Gomateswara" statue is situated here. About 108 miles from Bangalore and 52 miles from Mysore, the statue and the temples attract tourists and pilgrims throughout the year. Carved of only one boulder the statue is 60 feet high. The "Mahamastakabhisheka" is held once in 12 years.

NANJA NGUD: This historic town is 12 miles south of Mysore. Its temple of Nanjundeswara is a pilgrim centre.

MELKOTE: One of the sacred places specially for Vaishnavas in Mysore is this town, situated 33 miles from Bangalore. "Vairamudi" an important festival, takes place here some time in April every year. Sri Ramanujacharya's refuge, the temple is worth a visit.

SOMANATHPUR: About 33 miles from Mysore, the famous Somnathpur temple is situated. The elaborately carved structure with exquisite ceiling and idols are of interest to the visitors.

TALAKAD: This small town, situated on the left bank of the Cauvery in Mysore District, was once the capital of the Ganga kings. Here are six ancient temples partly buried in sands.

Sringeri Temple is a great pilg image centre



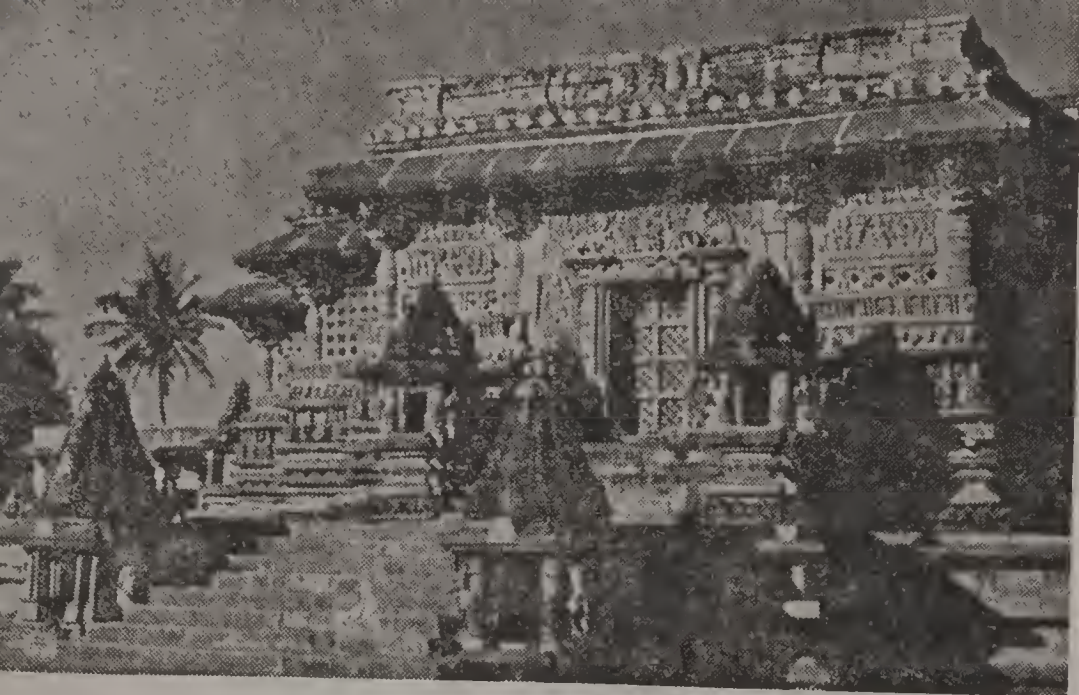
CHITALDURG: Headquarters of the District of the same name at the northern end of the state, this town has some historical interest. Here are a picturesque hill-fort and several temples. Near the town is Chandravalli where are found the ruins of an ancient City. Jogimatt hill station is three miles from here.

VANIVILAS SAGAR: Situated about 10 miles from Hiriya in Chitaldurg district, is this artificial lake, constructed by damming the Vedavati river between two hills.

SRINGERI: The Sringeri mutt, seat of Jagadguru Sri Shankaracharya is situated on the banks of River Tunga. The temple of Vidyashankara is rich in architectural beauty. The temple of Sharada, goddess of learning attracts many devotees all over South India.

AGUMBE: Situated at the head of the a ghat in the western ghats, Agumbe provides the grandest spectacle of Sunset. The distant view stretching from south Kanara down to Arabian Sea should be seen to be appreciated. One of the best resorts in the state.

BABABUDAN HILLS: These are the highest mountain range in the state. On the top of one of the hills

is a cave sacred to both Hindus and Muslims. The hills are famous for the Coffee plantations.

BELUR: World famous Hoysala temple known for the exquisite carvings and sculpture is a 'must' for every visitor of the state.

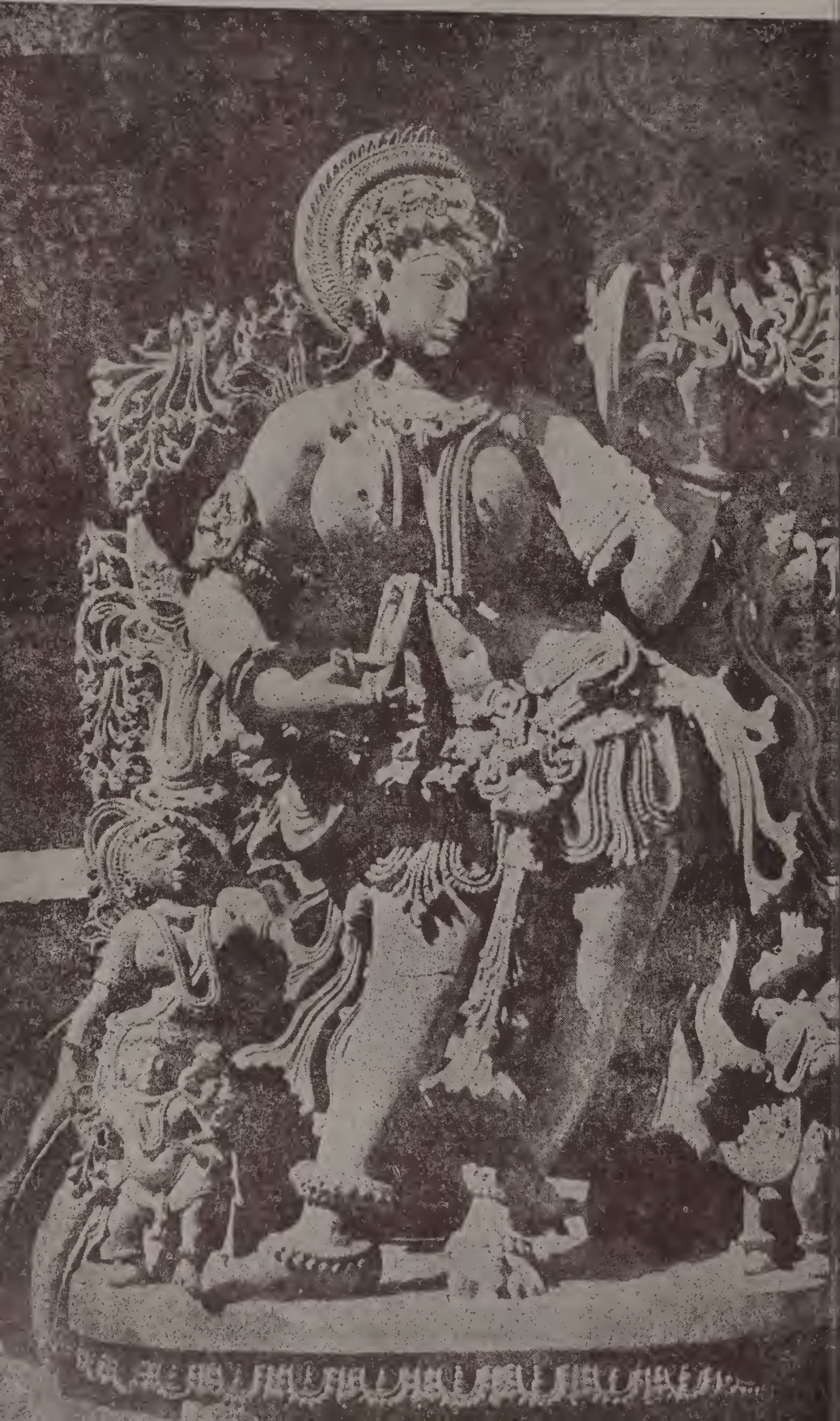
HALEBID: About 9 miles from Belur, a small village reminds the visitor of an ancient capital of a glorious kingdom of the Hoysala kings. Here is an unfinished temple on the walls of which "all that is wild in human faith and warm in human feeling is found portrayed."

JOG: The magnificent falls of Sharavathi at Jog are world famous. The Jog falls excel even the celebrated Niagara falls in height. The four falls formed by River Sharavathi reaching a chasm of 960 feet are called Raja, Roarer, Rocket and Rani. Here the State Government is generating electric power on a gigantic scale. The Second stage of the project, named after Mahatma Gandhi is under completion and accounts for a total supply of 120,000 kwt. of power. The falls situated in a corner of Shimoga district, is 232 miles from Bangalore.

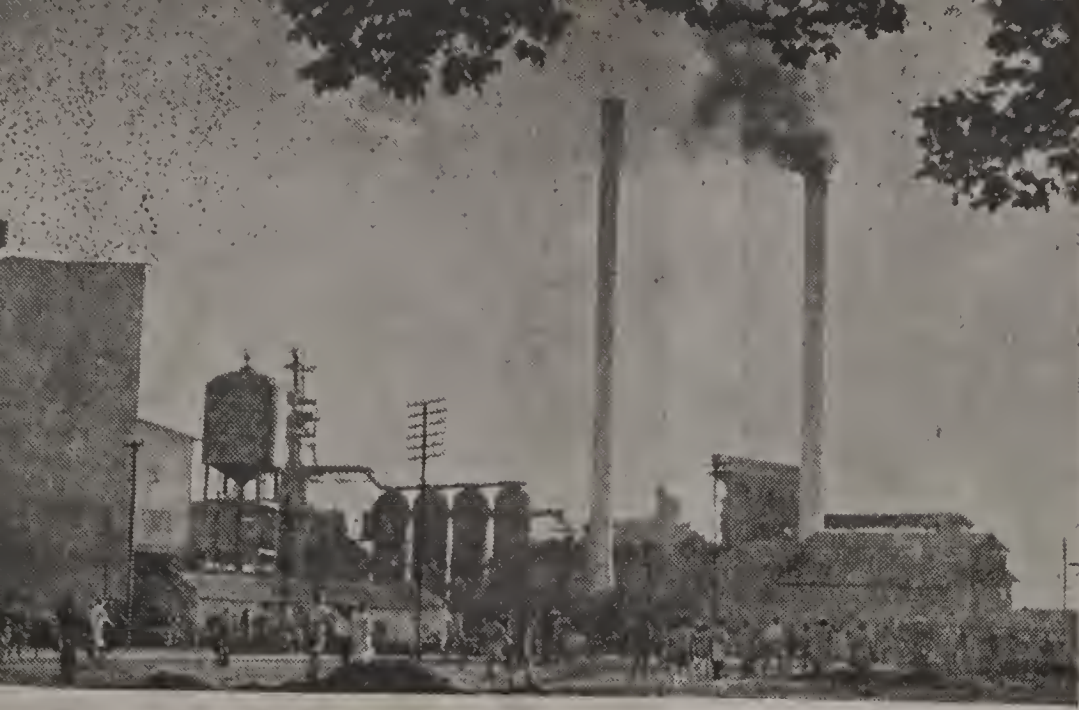
